
Sample A: Profile View










A: Success Rate of Surgeries










B: Relationships of Successful Transplants








C: Relationships of Failed Transplants

The Perfect Match





To accurately match the geometric discrepencies of each facial structure, precise measurements are made and compared.


To aid in the comfort of merging these facial samples to the face, extra fat and flesh from fresh cadavers may be used as filler in some places.

















EXCHANGE OF FACE Healing Process



3 months after the transplant.

The healing process that follows this procedure is very slow, and should be taken very seriously. At least six weeks bed rest is required for all patients, and it is recommended that each patient go on extended sick leave from work or school, for at least 15 weeks.

This couple is healing very nicely; you'll notice that the male (Sample B) can already smile, albeit very stiffly. The female (Sample A) has some trouble, but is adjusting well enough to make use of her cheek muscles.

It is very important that each patient look into therapy sessions with EXCHANGE OF FACE's suggested psychiatric help. After the acquisition of a new face, it is understandable--even expected-that it would take time getting used to.



After one year of healing and corrective surgery, SUCCESS!





There are many considerations to be taken into account before submitting oneself to the EXCHANGE OF FACE surgical procedure. Aside from the obvious question as to whether one would actually want to permanently affix the face of another onto ones face, there are also the serious medical issues that may surface during and after the surgery has transpired.

In the case of Example A, the females flesh did not properly accept the facial portion. The flesh quickly began to decay, and needed to be treated immediately with a silicone-based solution that permanently froze the piece in place, as you can see by the stiff discoloration. The subjects flesh in Example B did not take to the transplanted

The subjects flesh in Example B did not take to the transplanted sample at all. As a result, he is confined to bed rest for an indeterminant amount of time, as the wound leaves him very vulnerable to infection. It is likely that he will remain permanently deformed.
